From the Principal

Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends,

The annual Bishop's Excellence awards occurred on the 7th September at St Patrick's Cathedral in Parramatta. This prestigious award is made to one Year 12 student from each Catholic school in the Diocese of Parramatta, this year Joesph Elias was the recipient from St Patrick's Marist College. Each year the award seeks to recognise some of our outstanding young men and women, at the culmination of their schooling, who witness their Catholic faith and achieve well in their academic, sporting, creative, vocational or community endeavours. The student recipient should be a model for their peers and a source of inspiration and encouragement within their school communities, particularly in the expression of the Catholic life of our schools. The Award is also a recognition for the recipient's parents who have nurtured their son or daughter, as well as teachers who have instilled a passion for excellence.

We will be working on a number of strategies ranging from first wave intervention (in-class work), workshops and further small group interventions as required. During Term 4 we have opted to take part in the trial benchmark testing. This will help us in our preparations when our students will attempt the first of the tests, during Term 2 next year.



JOURNEY SPEECH

At a recent College Assembly, our College Captain Eleanor Dezius addressed the community reflecting on her time at St Patrick's Marist and what she sees as key elements for growth in learning.

Today I will be speaking to you all about our own Year 12 experience / overall journey and hopefully providing you all with a few key points and tips as you venture closer to that final finish line.

Throughout the year, I guess you could say you haven't really heard much from our cohort about what we together as one have achieved as well as the challenges and obstacles we have had to overcome. So today you will be given a small insight into the lives of Year 12 at St Patrick's Marist.

I remember after returning from the 2016 India Immersion trip I was straight back into school, starting my first day at St Patrick's Marist College as a year 12 student however still managing to look like a year 7 in doing so. I was, as I'm sure the rest of us were, filled with excitement and nervousness and honestly curiosity as to how our final few months of schooling will turn out.

Now I'm sure you have all heard either from teachers, parents, friends or even siblings that year 12 is that crazy year, full of stress, anxiety, constant study, minimal sleep and let's not forget absolutely no social life right? but despite how that may be somewhat true in certain aspects, Year 12 is undoubtedly the best year you will ever experience throughout your entire schooling life. However, it is up to you to make sure it is.

Your study habits, priorities, life balance, student-teacher relationships and commitment to school all play a major role in allowing you to make year 12 the best year yet.

HISTORY

Year 9 Archeological Dig

On the 21st of August, the Year 9 Elective History class of 2017 participated in a unique experience to establish our newest topic of archaeology. We excavated the sand pit on the ovals as part of this new topic. We used archeological techniques we had learnt in class and used tools and equipment similar to that used at archeological sites. We used techniques such as implementing the box grid system and using the methods to identify a possible location for an artefact or fossil. We used many tools such as brushes, trowels and sieves. We found priceless artefacts that were hidden for us in the sand by our teacher. These consisted of plastic coins, and cups and plates from a small toy set. We learned how to excavate artefacts and preserve them as well as take care of them efficiently to prevent damage. After this, our class learnt that it takes a great deal of patience, time and effort to work as an archaeologist at a major site and it takes a great deal of skill to find artefacts. After being asked about the experience, a student said "It was very interesting to be able to go out and do what archeologists would on a site with all the tools and everything." Another student told us "we will never give up until we find something".






NAPLAN Online 2017 School Readiness Testing

This note is to inform you that some personal information about students and parents which has already been obtained this year is being used again as schools prepare for NAPLAN online.

This personal information will be used by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA), which is the NAPLAN Test Administration Authority responsible for New South Wales.

NESA is responsible for collecting information to be used during the testing that schools are about to undertake to check their readiness for NAPLAN Online. This 'readiness testing' includes the management of student registration, test administration and reporting of results to schools.

The information NESA uses will include school name, year level, student name, date of birth and gender. NESA discloses this information to Education Services Australia Ltd (ESA), a national, not-for-profit company owned by Australia's state and territory education ministers. ESA is engaged by the Australian Government to operate the secure online platform used for NAPLAN Online.

NESA will not disclose to ESA any information about students who are not undertaking the readiness testing for NAPLAN Online.

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA), which conducts NAPLAN testing, will not access the information provided for the readiness testing.

The personal information provided by each school may be used to:

- conduct NAPLAN Online readiness testing
- provide reports relating to NAPLAN Online readiness testing
- conduct research, and compile and analyse statistics.

The information will not be disclosed other than for the purposes outlined above, unless authorised or required by law.


