DISABILITY PROVISIONS

Disability provisions are practical support designed to help students who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt in their HSC examinations based on a physical condition, visual impairment, hearing loss or trouble expressing ideas in writing due to a medical condition.

The provisions are granted by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) and are solely determined by how the student's exam performance is affected. Provisions may include braille papers, large-print papers, use of a reader and/ or writer, extra time, rest breaks and separate supervision.

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE

In 2018, St Patrick's Marist College is expanding its student iPad program by launching a 'Bring Your Own Device' program. Students in Years 7 to 12, will be able to bring Apple or Windows laptops or tablets to use for educational purposes. Having ongoing access to technological tools will enable your child to build the necessary digital literacy skills required in our ever-changing landscape.

Learning Experiences

Student devices will be used to access our Google suite including Goggle Classroom. Information and Communications Technology (ICT) is a powerful tool for learning and at St Patrick's Marist College we focus on using ICT tools embedded in best practice of teaching and learning to meet present and future learning needs for all students. We utilise technology in an innovative and creative manner so that the learning outcomes for students are presented with depth and quality. We use a combination of digital and traditional mediums of communication balancing both typing and handwriting activities, and integrating many internet services into the daily student experience.

Digital Citizenship

A focus of this initiative is digital citizenship, which is the responsible use of technology. Your child will learn digital skills, ethics, etiquette, and online safety. These are important aspects of participating in today's world.

Safe and Secure

To maintain a safe and secure learning environment, a filtered Internet connection is provided for students. They will not be permitted to use a personal broadband connection such as a 3G/4G phone network. As well, students will only be able to use their device under the direct supervision of their teacher. Any unauthorised use can result in the device being confiscated, searched, and privileges being revoked.



Responsibility

Students are solely responsible for their device. They must bring it fully charged to school. Similar to other personally owned items, St Patrick's Marist College is not liable for loss, damage, misuse, or theft.

Technical Support

Resources will be provided to help students connect their device to the school network. Your child must be familiar with how to use their device. Teachers will incorporate the use of your child's device into learning. However, they will not provide technical support.

We look forward to the educational opportunities that BYOD will bring. Participation in this initiative is compulsory. Your child will not be left out if they do not have a device. St Patrick's Marist College will continue to provide support to families who are unable to access a personal device for their child due to financial reasons. Please contact the College to discuss this matter further.

IPAD CHANGES

Since 2012 St Patrick's Marist College has integrated the use of technology into teaching and learning with the 1 to 1 iPad program. In 2018 this program is being broaden to a BYOD Program (outlined above) which includes all Apple, Windows based laptops or tablets. Please note that no Andriod based device will be supported.

Added to this, the advent of digital NAPLAN testing means that devices used by students must support the necessary requirements of the NAPLAN testing platform. Hence CEDP have instituted changes to what devices will be supported at all Catholic schools in Parramatta. This may mean that some older models of iPads will not be able to connect to our network from 2018.

These iPad models include: first four generations of the iPad; iPad 1 (2010), iPad 2 (2011), iPad Gen 3 (2012), and the iPad Gen 4 (2012) along with the iPad Mini (All iterations) will no longer be supported by the Diocese come 2018, and we encourage students not to bring those devices for schoolwork.

As outlined in the new BYOD program, students will now be able to bring a whole new range of devices to complete their schoolwork, including Macbooks, Chromebooks and Windows Laptops.



Dear Parents/Guardians of Year Ten Students,

The Year Ten End of Course Examinations will commence on Monday, 13th November and conclude on Monday, 20th November. Students only need to attend College for the exams, as there are no classes for Year Ten during this period.

Students with a morning exam need to be at the College before 8.40am. A student is expected to go directly home from the College after the morning examination if they do not have an afternoon examination and their conduct is to be exemplary. They are encouraged to plan and use their time productively in preparation for their next examination. Students sitting for an afternoon examination must be at the College 30 minutes before the starting time of the examination. (Please check timetable). Students who have a morning and afternoon examination on one day must stay at school and will be directed to the library. Students must wear school uniform to and from school and if required the College bag must be used.

In case of illness or misadventure, parents are required to contact Mr. Berner at the College. Any student absent from an examination or one or two days prior to the exams starting must have a Doctor's certificate to cover this absence. Failure to comply with this regulation may result in a zero (0) assessment being given. Students need to complete the online illness/misadventure form and supply a medical certificate to Ms Ellison on the first day that the student returns to the College even if this occurs during the examination period.

Students need to be familiar with Examination Procedures and Conditions printed in the College Diary. These conditions will be strictly enforced and if a student breaches the conditions a penalty may be imposed. Students also need to be reminded to check they have the necessary equipment for each examination. Students will require their NESA Number. Students must use a plastic sleeve to take items into the examination room. Mobile phones are not to be taken into the examination room.

<u>Disability Provisions:</u> A student requiring disability provisions should provide a letter from parents, with attached evidence to the Director of Studies by Friday 3rd November.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

ADVICE FOR 2017 YEAR 9 STUDENTS

March 2017

In 2020, you are required to achieve a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive your HSC.



PRACTICAL LITERACY AND NUMERACY SKILLS



Achieving the standard shows you, your parents and any future education and training providers and employers that you can do things like:

- follow instructions in equipment manuals
- write a job application
- calculate the quantity of materials to build a fence and prepare an invoice.

MULTIPLE OPPORTUNITIES TO MEET THE STANDARD

A pass mark in new online reading, writing and numeracy tests will prove you have achieved the standard.



The tests will take place at your school and you can take them up to twice a year in:

- Year 10
- Year 11
- Year 12
- If you need to, you can even take them for up to five years after you start your first HSC course.

The tests will be available from next year when you are in Year 10.

YEAR 9 NAPLAN: A CHANCE TO PREQUALIFY FOR THE STANDARD

- By achieving Band 8 or above in your Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tests this year, you can prequalify for the standard. This means that you won't have to take the online tests.
- It is important you know that you can still receive the HSC if you don't achieve Band 8 in your Year 9 NAPLAN tests this year.



Your literacy and numeracy skills will continue to develop, and with support from your school, you will achieve the standard either by the end of Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12.
